WORKERS' RIGHTS



- Cesar Chavez was born in Yuma, Arizona and grew up knowing how hard life was for farm workers.
- When he was 17, he joined the U.S. Navy.
- Chavez worked with the Community Service Organization (CSO), a group that worked for the justice (fair treatment under the law) of all people. Chavez helped thousands of people from Mexico become U.S. citizens. He believed that Mexican-Americans should have the same rights as all Americans.
- He started a labor union to help farm workers win recognition of their rights. A labor union can make employers give their workers better pay and working conditions.
- Boycotts (refusal to use/buy certain goods), strikes (refusal to work), and marches were all nonviolent actions that were ways to express workers' rights.
- In 1966, Chavez helped form the United Farm Workers (UFW).
- President Bill Clinton awarded Chavez the Presidential Medal of Freedom for his work fighting for the justice of all Americans.
